Answer to the key questions

Q: What role does the territorial cooperation play in the Baltic Sea area? Should there be more or less in the future?

A: There should be more transnational cooperation, but it must be based on regional priorities and needs

Q: What are the obstacles to territorial cooperation in the Baltic Sea area? How to overcome them?

A: The transnational component is one answer among others

Q: What role does and should the EU, the nations and the regions play and with what main objectives for this cooperation on different levels between different stakeholders?

A: Actors at all levels should contribute to the use of Article 70 and the transnational component in a way that really makes a difference

Cleaner Growth "in short"

- Collaboration platform, 75 cleantech companies
- Commercialization (scouting, business support)
- Internationalisation (international partnerships, support to export, attracting investments)
- Västerbotten incl Örnsköldsvik
- Crossborder collaboration with the Vaasaregion





Cleaner Growth BSR Cluster Project Transnational Component

- Cleaner Growth Pilot project in the Baltic Sea Region
- Development and testing of the transnational component of ERDF
- 13 regions / nations with cleantech in their S3 strategies
- Appointed clusters / innovation actors presented 5 project proposals
- The MA network prioritises project proposals to proceed with





Why use the transnational component?

- Cleantech companies in Northern Sweden increases their profitability by cooperating and doing business in the Baltic Sea Region.
- Cooperation must be based on business needs. It requires fast and flexible procedures.
- Macro-regional programs must be combined with new tools based on the needs of regions and companies. For example Article 70 and the transnational component.
